Green and Complete Streets Advisory Council (GCSC)

ABOUT

Streets and sidewalks carry not only people and goods, but also various utilities and stormwater runoff. City streets also represent a sizeable portion of the city's overall land use, house many of its publicly managed trees, and serve as windows into the city for visitors and residents alike. City streets and sidewalks must serve people of all ages and abilities, while creating more mobility and independence for young people, seniors, and people with disabilities. They serve motorists, non-motorists, residents in wheelchairs, parents pushing strollers, kids biking and walking to school, and people who can't afford to use, or prefer not to use motor vehicles.

The City of Providence will develop a safe, reliable, equitable, efficient, inviting, integrated and connected multimodal transportation system that will promote access, mobility and health for all users and abutters, while also improving environmental quality and reducing polluted stormwater runoff. The City will create a connected network of right-of-way facilities accommodating all modes of travel to the maximum practical extent. This network will promote walking and biking on city streets and sidewalks, provide access to public transportation, beautify and shade the City's parks, schools, healthy food retail establishments, and reduce and treat polluted stormwater.

The Green and Complete Streets Advisory Council was created by ordinance in July 2021. Its responsibilities are to:

Review Procedure

- Review of Conceptual & 30% Plans
 During project development, make recommendations to improve design
- Waivers from requirements of ordinance Mode-specific, GCSC approves or denies
- Traffic calming: in edge cases, after traffic study, GCSC can recommend Traffic Engineer give "preliminary approval"
- All City activities: annually review "all existing plans, manuals, checklists, decision-trees, rules, regulations, and programs"

Amendment changes

Signed by Mayor Smiley 12/21/23

- Adds "any removal of complete streets features" to scope of review
- Adds 2 alternate members to GCSC
- Members would now serve until replacement appointed
- Tweaks traffic calming thresholds to fix too wide eligibility of short, low-traffic streets
- Requires other boards to seek GCSC opinion if relevant (while keeping to required deadlines)
- Big changes after review need waiver if reduce safety
- Specifying in the ordinance that a quorum of GCSC is 3 voting members

Projects Update

- Comp Plan update project next month
- RAISE planning grant around Waterplace Park, negotiating with sole bidder
- Applying to new federal grant rounds for North Main Street design & targeted intersection safety improvements
- Paving & sidewalks schedule for 2024
 - Hardly any paving planned for this year, only finishing touches on 2023 projects including Westminster/Dorrance crosswalks
 - A few scattered sidewalks throughout City:
 Vandewater St, Wallace St, Clarence St, Woodbine
 St, Ponagansett Ave, a few blocks of Admiral St,
 Terrace Ave, Union Ave, River Ave, Public St

6-10 Connector update 1/10/24

- "Next couple weeks": Highway ramp
 6E→10S done
- Spring: 10N offramp to Westminster open
- Spring/Summer: New Olneyville-side service road & Tobey St bridge
- Final pieces (Spring/Summer): shared-use path, Pilsudski connection, final highway paving, and landscaping

6-10 Connector Follow-ups

- "Upon completion of the Westminster Street off ramp this spring, the [east-side] Service Road will be rebuilt and return to its previous alignment between Oak and Union."
- "New traffic signals will have pedestrian heads and push button activation" [not automatic pedestrian recall]
- "Lighting is still to be installed on Tobey Street. The shared use path will not have dedicated lighting, but the path is adjacent to the highway or the Service Road, both of which are lit." [Unclear whether pedestrian bridge over Amtrak will have lighting, likely not]
- "The shared use path will run north from Union Ave on the west side of the existing Service Road and intersect with Westminster Street, Broadway and Tobey Street. It will cross Tobey Street and connect to Harris Ave. It will terminate on Helme Street. It will be separated from traffic."

Shared Micromobility

- Bird bankruptcy not expected to impact either Bird or Spin operations (debt restructuring & already working with new hedge fund owners)
- Bird's bikes are all broken, working to pull them all
- New permit cycle starting in Spring:
 - Corral-only parking in Downtown & College Hill
 - Fewer operators, fewer devices

Safe Streets For All Schedule

- As soon as new GCSC fully appointed:
 GCSC conceptual discussions by segment
- Spring: Design consultants on board
- Spring '24 Summer '25: Outreach & design for all segments, Great Streets Plan update
- 2025-6: "Preliminary Design" done, NEPA submission, construction procurement
- 2026-8: Construction
